Project Reflection

When I started this project, I thought that it would be somewhat hard to find the information first of all, but then I also thought that it would be difficult to create someone's life. I don't remember where I got the idea to do this as a project, but I remember wanting to do a project about World War II. The more I thought about this project though, the more I liked the idea. It seemed to get more and more interesting as I added new ideas to it too.

Emilia Coen

When I started researching for Emilia's "life", I found information that I could use, and some that I could not. When I looked at the information that was found, I would try to see if I could use it to create someone's life from it. In this case it was Emilia's life.

At first I didn't have a name for her, I just knew that she was going to be a Jewish mother and was going to be living through a rough time in world history. It wasn't until after I was done collecting information that I found a name for her. As I was reading a story about someone who had actually survived from World War 2, they mentioned someone named Emilia. I liked the name, but most of all I liked the way they spelled it. So that was to be her name. Now I just needed to come up with names for her family members. The other names I found the same way as Emilia's. Manya Riebel

Manya was the mother I choose to have as a mother living right in the middle of the German world. She was going to love her country, but not support what was taking place during World War 2. This was my original thought, but then when I was finding information, I thought I might have to change the idea. I was wrong. I was able to keep this thought the same while creating a life for her and her family.

Manya's family consists of her sons Erich – 18, Levi - 12, Leo – 8, and daughter Jennine – 5. Her husband died some time before I started the entries in her diary. As with Emilia and her family's names, I didn't have names for the Riebel family when I first started either. I found the names the same way too.

After I had the names picked out for her family, I could use the information I had gathered to write her diary. I thought it would be just this easy as it was with Emilia's diary, but I found out differently. I started with a date and something to write about when I wrote Emilia's diary, but with Manya's, I had to just start with something. I had to do this because with the information I had I needed to create her sons life first. It was harder to do this, and I found out through writing this diary that I ran into this problem many more times. I had to create more of a background for Erich than I had to for Isak. This made the writing a little more difficult, but once I got started on it, the words just seemed to come out.

I think that it was good for me to write a diary like this too because I had never really learned anything about the fighting of World War II. I learned what it might have been like to be someone who was fighting. I thought that it was really cool to learn this, but it was also hard to believe. The numbers of people who were killed, the amount of fighting that went on, the thoughts behind what Adolf Hitler thought was a "perfect" human race, and just other things that I never knew before. I really enjoyed writing these diaries too.
